

MN Community Problem Solving (CmPS) Team Earns Top Honors!

Shyla Gordon and Fatuma Hassan, took <u>FIRST Place</u> in the Senior Division.

But wait! There's more! There work also brought home the most aspired for "Beyonder Award."

Shyla and Fatuma are from St. Cloud North Junior High and St. Cloud High School (respectively), and are coached by Karlyn Doyle and Tom Warnemunde.

Their project is titled, "Who's on The Other Side?"

<u>Project Description</u>: According to the Minnesota Bureau of Criminal Apprehension, there's been a 2,781.16% increase in cyber tips of suspected online crimes against children in Minnesota between 2010-2021. How might we minimize the risk of child grooming, so that children in Minnesota can safely use the internet in 2021 and beyond? "Who's on the Other Side?" gets the conversation started on this touchy subject through age-appropriate lessons developed by students, for students in grades 3-12 and adults too! Partnering with other student groups helps to spread the message and sustain efforts to keep personal safety at the forefront of students' minds when online.

CmPS is not for the "faint of heart." This two year project is ongoing as these young ladies work to assure sustainability. Their success in the goal is reflected in having <u>earned the "Beyonder Award</u>." Dr. E. Paul Torrance coined the word "Beyonder" to describe projects that "outdistance the others so far that they are not even on the same scale." Team or Individual CmPS students who have demonstrated an exceptional

depth, passion, and commitment in the project that goes above and beyond what would normally be expected of students are considered for the Beyonder Award. Evaluators may nominate a project they believe should be considered for the Beyonder Award for it to be compared with other nominated projects using the Beyonder Evaluation Matrix. The nomination of project(s) does not guarantee that a Beyonder Award will be given. Beyonder Characteristics include:

- 1. Pursued the Project with intensity
- 2. Extended *beyond the scope of ordinary attempts* to address the Area of Concern
- 3. Displayed an <u>intense love for their work</u> in implementing the Project
- 4. Demonstrated <u>remarkable creativity</u>
- 5. Displayed <u>exceptional motivation</u> to address/overcome obstacles
- 6. Demonstrated Project has Depth
 - ✓ Displayed notable delight in deep thinking
 - ✓ Demonstrated <u>uncommon reflective</u> thinking throughout the Project
 - ✓ Made a truly profound difference in their community
 - ✓ Showed <u>exceptional concern for the</u> <u>sustainability</u> of the project

MAGIC stands for Multi-Affiliate Global Issues Competition. For this competition, students from multiple Affiliates are matched to create a team who meet for the first time at the start of the competition. These students introduce themselves, share their skills, read the Future Scene, and then work to apply the six-step problem solving process to create a plan of action. What a great experience for kids to practice a real life, impromptu, collaboration that often needs to happen in the workplace.

Thank you, Owen, for your persistent passion that keeps us focused on our future, not our past.



Congratulations to "Creating the Future Scholarship" Recipient, Michelle Li!


The "Creating the Future" scholarship was established in 2010 in honor of Dr. E. Paul Torrance, creativity guru and founder of Future Problem Solving Program.
