Section One:

Ϋ́nsect specializes in making food based on butterflies and bees, but not only are these bugs hosts to a large variety of parasites, they are also probably the most beloved insects. Between butterflies' pure aesthetic appeal and bees' archetypal position as a helpful pollinator, the optics of crushing

these insects into food are not good. "If Ÿnsect can produce bees for our consumption, why can't those bees instead be used to pollinate traditional farms, or to make honey? If Ÿnsect can farm fully grown butterflies, why can't they just farm mealworms or crickets?" These are the questions the public will always have if Ÿnsect continues its insect choice. We can't have Ÿnsect become a stain on the insect-based food industry, so artists, scientists, and influencers will start a social movement pressuring Ÿnsect to pivot away from using butterflies and bees. The movement will use pieces such as "Not the Butterflies!", making appeals to people's emotions to gain traction. It will also utilize logos and pathos by incorporating facts from various reputable scientists in captions or other pieces. This movement, and it's eventual success, will not only improve people's attitudes towards Ÿnsect, but towards eating insect-based foods care about their customers and hear out their concerns.

<u>Section Two</u>: Highlight the aspects of the artistic work you have created. How was it constructed, and why did you put it together that way? I wanted to explore a somewhat retro (and propaganda-like) feel, and this inspired the inking on the butterfly and the accusatory text. I kept to black and white because it set a serious mood and also made the text feel more oppressive towards the butterfly. The contrast in the level of detail between the butterfly and everything else is supposed to draw attention to the butterfly's beauty and delicateness. We should protect our pollinating <u>friend</u>, not eat it.
