I will make the program more accessible to the most possible people - regardless of age, time available, income, kids or not, etc.

Many people can't afford to take time off work or they have children who would be too young, so they'd need to find childcare, which is expensive. Childcare and age-appropriate activities will be available.

Since this is on an island, there will be a basic education program that people could take to determine if they want to do the program, so they can make an informed decision.

Not all older people could handle the tasks, and people who are disabled are also essentially disqualified from completing the program. That would create an unnecessary social divide, especially if the program becomes popular. I will incorporate jobs that are able to be finished by older adults and those who have more limited mobility, etc.

They will have an intern program so that high school or college students could gain experience and/or credits in that field.

I didn't apply much metaphor in my piece; rather, I created an actual vision I have in the context of the future scene. I stuck mainly to a palette of blue and teal to retain the oceanic feel given by the future scene. The background was painted onto polymer clay, then covered in resin. Resin makes up the other two sides, as well as some of the accessories. The creatures were made of clay. The people are simple tracings of reference photos with shading, with a clay backing for support. Though most of the work is not related to the people themselves, the basic, intentionally unfinished appearance is a stark contrast to the bright colors of the resin, paint, and glitter. The ambiguity leaves empty space for our own minds to complete their identities.
